Team Updates Nominations Team

The Nominations Team Needs:

Who?

The Nominations Team is composed of one member from each area of the state.

The Team shall be elected at the State Convention in odd numbered years by ballot to serve for four (4) years on a rotation basis. The primary consideration of the Nominations Team should be to seek the best leadership available. Each member of the Team shall review all endorsements submitted for each position.

What?

To provide Colorado State with a slate of the best qualified candidates to fill elected positions for each Biennium

When?

TIMELINE

March (year prior to election) - Submit article to Colorado Peaks and Plains regarding the election

March (year prior to election) - Distribute information/nomination forms to chapter presidents at the Spring Executive Board Meeting (dkgcolorado.com)

October (year prior to election) - Give update at Colorado State Fall Executive Board Meeting November 17 (year prior to election) - Nominees submit nomination forms and photos to Team Chairman

February 15 (year of the election) - Nominations Team Chairman sends photos and biographies of nominees to Colorado Peaks and Plains editor for March publication

March (year of the election) - Present Slate of Officers at Spring Executive Board Meeting

June (year of the election) - Presentation of Slate, Voting and Installation at Colorado State Convention

Why?

Because Colorado State needs strong, dedicated women in leadership positions to represent our members throughout the state. Your organization needs you!

How?

The Nominations Team shall submit, in election years, the name of one (l) nominee for each elective office and nominees for the Nominations Team.

The Nominations Team shall request the membership to recommend members capable and willing to serve as state officers and Nominations Team members.

The slate of officers, with candidate qualifications, shall be published in the <u>Colorado</u> <u>Peaks and Plains</u> sixty (60) days prior to the State Convention.

After the report of the Team has been made to the convention, additional nominations may be made from the floor, with the consent of the nominee.

Elections shall be by ballot and a majority vote of the members present and voting at the business session of the State Convention elects. If there is but one nominee for an office, the election may be by voice vote.

The Nominations Team shall prepare the ballot and conduct the election.

How?

Committee Responsibilities:

Follows the Colorado State Colorado Bylaws/Standing Rules in the officer selection process;

Corresponds with Chapter Presidents about nominations for Nominations Team members from their respective areas;

Submits articles/slate of officers and Nominations Team nominees for Colorado Peaks and Plains publications in a timely manner;

Presents the slate of officers at the Spring Colorado State Executive Board Meeting;

Prepares the ballot and conducts the elections at the State Convention:

Meets at Colorado State Executive Board Meetings to develop and review goals, process, guidelines and timelines;

Revises nominations form is needed;

Communicates with Team members throughout the biennium

Emotionality (E)

Facets: Fearfulness, Anxiety, Dependence, Sentimentality

Adjectives: {emotional, oversensitive, sentimental, fearful, anxious, vulnerable} *versus* {brave, tough, independent, self-assured, stable} **Extraversion (X)**:

Facets: Social self-esteem, social boldness, sociability, liveliness

Adjectives: {outgoing, lively, extraverted, sociable, talkative, cheerful, active} *versus* {shy, passive, withdrawn, introverted, quiet, reserved} **Agreeableness (A)**:

Facets: Forgivingness, gentleness, flexibility, patience

Adjectives: {patient, tolerant, peaceful, mild, agreeable, lenient, gentle} *versus* {ill-tempered, quarrelsome, stubborn, choleric}

Conscientiousness (C):

Facets: Organization, diligence, perfectionism, prudence

Adjectives: {organized, disciplined, diligent, careful, thorough, precise} *versus* {sloppy, negligent, reckless, lazy, irresponsible, absent-minded}

Openness to experience (O):

Facets: Aesthetic appreciation, inquisitiveness, creativity, unconventionality

Adjectives: {intellectual, creative, unconventional, innovative, ironic} *versus* {shallow, unimaginative, conventional}

We also brought our favorite recipes. The recipes were put into a cookbook. We received our cookbooks in January.

Have you ever heard of Annie Wilkins? I hadn't. I happened across this book on Pinterest and thought it looked interesting. I grew up on a small ranch southeast of Arriba, Colorado. My sister and I were my dad's "hired hands" so we were busy working cattle at all times of the year and during all sorts of weather. The idea of a lone woman crossing the United States on her horse was fascinating to me. Annie Wilkins was no ordinary woman of her time. Her ride took place in 1954, a time when most women were homemakers. Having grown up in Maine on a small acreage, Annie knew the meaning of hard

work for very little return. At sixty-three, she had been married twice, had lost all her relatives, and was in the process of losing the family farm. The final straw was learning that she had only two more years to live. Annie didn't want to spend the last years of her life in the cold of Maine, living in the county home for indigents.

Annie decided that she wanted to see California before she died. With that New England determination that is so famous, Annie purchased a hardy horse that she named Tarzan, she packed up her clothes (wearing most of them), tied a leash on her little dog Depeche Toi, and set out for California in NOVEMBER. Having determined to travel through the states because of weather southern considerations, Annie set out in a southeasterly direction. News of her trek preceded her, and everywhere she went, she was met with hospitality, care, and helpfulness.

This book depicts an America that was changing drastically. Most roads were being transformed from dirt tracks to paved highways upon which cars and trucks were speeding along. Unbeknownst to Annie, she became somewhat of a celebrity. Her celebrity proved to be helpful to her because she was able to use it to earn funds for her travels. Annie made many friends on her journey, including a new equine companion named Rex.

While I have not finished this book, I am definitely enjoying it very much. I'm anticipating Annie's journey across the Rocky Mountains and the Sierras with a bit of trepidation! I'll update you when I finish!
